Proposed 2016/2017 Budget is Within the Tax Levy Limit

Sustaining the excellence expected of our school district and maintaining its fiscal stability are our priorities as your Board of Education. We know that education is a sound investment in our children's future. It is our collective goal to educate the whole child—academically, socially and emotionally. Our commitment is to provide opportunities so that our students can successfully meet the challenges of college, career, and citizenship. The reality of achieving these goals requires careful management, strategic planning, and the collective efforts of District staff, community members and, of course, our students. The budget we are presenting maintains our educational staffing levels and the programs which provide our students the means for growth and opportunity.

We are proud of our students and all their achievements. We must continue to improve and anticipate the needs as we plan for their future. To that end, the District has undertaken several initiatives. First, we will continue to provide all South Side High School students with International Baccalaureate classes in 11th grade English and Social Studies. Research has shown students who are engaged in the more rigorous IB coursework are provided with a strong foundation for college and career readiness. Additionally the District is expanding on its successful Middle School Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math (STEAM) initiative and has begun to offer STEAM curriculum at both the elementary and high school levels. Computer coding and robotics, for example, are supported and provided for in this budget. The District has also continued its program to provide iPads to all students. In grades K-4 classes are provided with iPads to share; in grade 5 each student has an individualized iPad to use at school and in grades 6-12 each student has an iPad for use at school as well as at home.

Our community's high expectations and historic support of our public schools are reflected in the budget we are presenting which is within the New York State Tax Levy Cap. This State law mandates the total increase amount to our budget that can be raised through property taxes is capped at 2% or the rate of inflation, whichever is lower. It is not a limit on the assessed value, tax rate, or the amount which an individual homeowner's taxes may increase. Our District's proposed 2016/2017 tax levy increase is lower than the allowable limit. With the exclusions allowed by the State, the District's maximum allowable tax levy cap increase this year is calculated to be .85%. If you have not had the opportunity to attend one of our Budget Work Sessions, we encourage you to view the presentations and documents that are available on the home page of the District website (www.rvcschools.org). We must work together as a school-community. Your vote plays an important part in Rockville Centre's continued excellence in education.

Rockville Centre School District's long-range planning has allowed the District to develop a . budget that keeps educational expectations high while minimizing the cost to District residents. Some of the steps taken to keep expenditures low are:

- Working with all bargaining units to fairly settle contracts and negotiate increased employee contributions to health insurance. •
- Cooperatively bidding for services and supplies with BOCES, other districts, the County and the State.
- Participating in County-wide transportation consortiums thereby reducing costs.
- Utilizing BOCES services in lieu of private contracts in an effort to increase State aid.
- Reducing tax anticipation note borrowing thus reducing interest payments.
- Completing a comprehensive energy upgrade at no net cost to the taxpayer and realizing guaranteed energy savings.

- Allows for students to participate in extracurricular activities and community service events.

Technology Initiatives Supported by the Budget

As part of our ongoing commitment Education is one of our most precious to technology and building 21st century skills for all of our students, we are supporting several technology initiatives with our proposed with Nassau BOCES which allows the District

laptops in all of our buildings. Even though our students now have access to iPads, laptops are still necessary for in-depth research and expanded essay writing, as well as accessing software. The laptops will also be utilized as New York State moves towards online testing. Funds are allocated to ensure our firewalls are sturdy to keep our students safe as they explore the Internet. Included the proposed budget are within SmartBoards, replacement projectors and carts in which to store the technology. With the introduction of programs such as Hour of Code and Robotics, and the addition of enhancements to our curriculum, we have seen the ties between technology and education grow even stronger throughout the District. Part of the Rockville Centre educational mission is to prepare our students for tomorrow's changing world. We feel strongly that the proposed 2016/2017 school budget helps do



UPDATE ON THE SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT BOND

On September 1, 2015, students at South Side High School and Watson Elementary School entered buildings with newly completed additions. At the High School, the new construction holds a new fitness room, a music lab and photography and art rooms. Reconfiguration in the main building of the High School also took place last summer, creating five classrooms where the library previously existed and allowing for the Outdoor Structures classroom to be brought into the main building. At Watson Elementary School, the new construction includes three classrooms and a small instructional space. South Side High School Principal, John Murphy, said, "By the 3rd day of school, students were perfectly acclimated with the new space and it was as though the art wing had been there all along."

District-wide installation of classroom air-conditioning began in 2014 and is expected to be completed by May 2016, just in time for the hotter days of June prior to the ending of school. The installation of main assembly space air-conditioning units at the elementary buildings will begin this summer. District-wide safety upgrades to classroom locksets is also underway.

This summer will be a busy time in the school district as work on the next phase of the School Improvement Bond projects continues. South Side High School will see the completion of the south addition. Construction on this addition has been moving along steadily throughout the school year. Currently, the foundation of the new structure has been poured, the roof decking completed and the block walls, along with the electrical and plumbing, have been installed. This addition will hold the new library, updated science rooms, a new social studies classroom, a chemical storage room, a new testing center and social worker and psychologist offices. The main building at South Side High School will also see interior renovations and upgrades. This work includes updating the kitchen and almost doubling the seating capacity in the student cafeteria, creating a new chemistry office, and moving and upgrading the research lab and greenhouse. South Side Middle School will also see some work over the summer months, including upgrades to the library and the auditorium and adding ADA access to the music rooms.

In order to complete the extensive work in the school buildings over the summer, the District, working with Village staff, has relocated some of the school district and the Rockville Centre Recreation Center summer programs. A detailed list of these relocations is available on the District website.


Student Achievements
